281 TO DISCUSS SPORTS CLUBS MATTERS

282 TO DISCUSS 20 MPH RESPONSES

The chair explained we had a good response from the 20MPH leaflet drop. The Assistant Clerk has gone through the responses and has a rough tally of numbers for and against but there is a lot with conditions. It was suggested to have a group of councillors to go through the responses together before applying for the funding.

Councillor Paul Allan, Councillor Deborah Alderwick and Councillor Kevin Cuffley all offered to go through the responses including the resident present Kerrin Compton. The Assistant Clerk will contact them all to organise a date before the next meeting. Councillor Kevin Deeming suggested bringing options to the next meeting as we are running out of time to get the application completed and submitted.

283 TO DISCUSS LAND AT MILL LANE HOUSING SURVEY

The parish council have been contacted by Cambridge ACRE on behalf of Carter Jonas to ask if the parish council would do a letter to support the housing survey and if they would add a letter to go in the survey packs for delivery to every house in Sawston. Cambridge ACRE sent the parish council a draft letter, the parish council discussed this and did not agree with sending a letter to be included in the survey packs. The councillors would like more clarity on the housing survey and suggested the assistant clerk invites them to attend a meeting.

284 TO DISCUSS TAPS AT SPICERS

The facilities administrator received quotes to replace 15 taps at Spicers back in September 2025 but the plumber, which was agreed had quoted for single taps, but we need double

mixer taps so the facilities administrator as obtained quotes again for 5 mixer push taps the quotes are:

- £1,140 including vat
- £2,310 no vat

It was **proposed** by Councillor Kevin Cuffley and **seconded** by Councillor Kieran Cooper to accept the quote for £1,140 including vat to replace 5 double taps at Spicers Sports Pavilion.

The Assistant Clerk contacted three companies for both the printing and the delivery of this year's chair report. She managed to get three quotes for the printing but only one replied regarding the delivery.

287 TO DISCUSS CEMETERY FEE FOR NON-RESIDENT

The parish council have been contacted by a Sawston resident who had a Ukraine refugee live with them in 2023 before later moving to Cambridge and sadly have passed away and would like their ashes to be interred in Sawston cemetery at the Sawston discounted price. Following discussion, the Council has confirmed that under the Cemetery Fees and Charges Policy, they are considered a resident for the purposes of interment fees. Although they subsequently moved away from the parish, the policy states that a person is only classed as a non-resident after having left the parish for a period of five years. As this period has not elapsed, the resident (discounted) fee applies. The Council therefore agrees that the interment may proceed at the resident rate, in accordance with current policy.

288 TO DISCUSS CEMETERY WALL ON CAMBRIDGE ROAD

The cemetery wall on Cambridge Road has been damaged in several places due to tree root growth, mostly along the left-hand side. As a result of this damage, sections of the railings have snapped and were removed by the Head Groundskeeper due to health and safety concerns. The Parish Council discussed options for remedial works, including whether to replace the wall on a like-for-like basis or to rebuild the wall to a greater height without reinstating the railings. Councillors agreed that the railings and gates are not necessary, as the cemetery always remains open. It was agreed that the Assistant Clerk should obtain two quotations: One to rebuild the wall to its current height, retaining the existing pillars and one to rebuild the wall with the removal of the pillars. It was also suggested that consideration be given to installing a single railing along the top of the wall.

JHC Support Service information for Parish Council meeting

This information relates to the year of 2025 from 1st January to 31st December

* 357 clients were seen so very similar numbers to 2024.

* Just over 800 food bags have been given out, so less than 2024 when we gave out 956. £ almost £1000 co-op vouchers have been issued, down on 2024 when £1300 were given out.

* 137 Christmas Hampers were delivered, 5 more than in 2024. £3435 supermarket vouchers were also included with the hampers.

* Enquiry type – our top enquiry is Grants (684) and has been for the last few years. Benefits are second highest enquiry (218), followed by housing which remained static at 100 enquiries Debt (50) which has doubled since 2024,

*Individual grants – Total grants given to individuals was in excess of £90,000.

Some of these grants were from other sources not just the JHC grant pot. This included Staywell for help with utility bills, Cambridgeshire Local Assistance Scheme & the Household Support Fund.

*Organisational grants given out to the value of £28, 246.

Other JHC info

Team update – Our apprentice business administrator has settled in well, and we recruited a new family worker who started at the beginning of December as Corinne retired just before Christmas. Donna has settled in well and is currently working in all Sawston schools as well as William Westley & Stapleford.

We are extremely busy with appointments being booked at least 3-4 weeks in advance.

We are seeing a considerable increase in Clients who have gambling debts and are referring to agencies who specialise in this area of support. This is a quite serious issue and is affecting both sexes and people from all income brackets.

We continue to see lots of people with health conditions, and the number of clients over the age of 80 has increased significantly in the last couple of years.

Property & land - Redrow communicated with us just before Christmas informing us that following the merger between Barratt, David Wilson and Redrow, David Wilson are now building some of our units on the Tudor meadows site, they will be building the Redrow design house types so there is no change. This is the next phase of 5 x one-bedroom properties due to be completed by October 2026.

6 new residents moved into JHC properties in 2025.

Mordante house had a fire in March, fortunately no one was hurt and damage was limited to one bedroom and the communal lounge. A long process followed eventually agreeing contractors and a price in December. Work started early January 2026.
